We are delighted to present this report on the state of the American Leadership Forum. In the past year, our eight chapters have experienced incredible change, marked by leadership transitions, a shifting funding landscape, as well as catalytic social and political upheaval. This past year has also been one of significant growth and achievement for ALF National, all made possible by the dedication of our staff, the generosity of our donors and board members, and the support of our national Senior Fellow Network.

What we continue to learn is that ALF's work to foster and practice dialogue across difference is foundational to a healthy democracy. Our signature Fellows Program continues to attract phenomenal top-tier leaders from across the country. These are leaders, nominated by you, who are intentionally brought together and whose paths may never have otherwise crossed. We now have 5000+ Senior Fellows nationwide.

We are particularly proud of the roll out and implementation of ALF Connect, our national directory and communication hub. For the first time in our 40-plus year history, we connected all 5000 Senior Fellows, residing in 46 states, to each other through a network weaving app. We're also proud of the incredible turnout for our National Speaker and Dialogue events. In the past cycle we met with Meg Wheatley, Otto Scharmer, Charles Weathers, and hosted WE THE PEOPLE, a hybrid convening that brought together over a hundred leaders across political ideologies in seven U.S. regions to practice dialogue across our differences.

As we look ahead, we are excited to build upon the successes of the past year. Our focus remains the same: to support each chapter in delivering a powerful and impactful Fellows experience and to excel at connecting leaders across difference and build their individual and collective capacity for principled conflict and dialogue.

As we continue to grow, we are also keenly aware of whose shoulders we stand upon. ALF founder Joseph Jaworski wrote, "We can't take the United States the way it was handed to us. We've got to rebuild with each generation." Thank you to our donors, volunteer board, staff, and partners for your invaluable contributions. Your dedication and hard work are the driving force behind our success.

OUR PURPOSE

ALF is passionately committed to building diverse networks of leaders focused on personal and community transformation in order to create inclusive and thriving communities.

American Leadership Forum (ALF) was founded in 1980 in Houston by Joseph Jaworski, who left his successful law practice to address what he increasingly saw as a crisis of leadership throughout the country. He envisioned an organization dedicated to bringing together diverse leaders from multiple sectors in communities across the country to explore their personal leadership capacity, build deep trust among the group to help each leader get beyond the devaluing prejudices that we all hold, and discover new possibilities.

In 1996, Jaworski published Synchronicity: The Inner Path of Leadership and chronicled the story of the American Leadership Forum and the principles and values ALF embodies. For over 40 years, ALF chapters have trained and empowered leaders who transform their communities by living a leadership model organized around altruism, interdependence, and receptivity.


ALF now has eight chapters: Charlotte NC; Great Valley (Northern San Joaquin Valley), CA; Houston/Gulf Coast, TX; Mountain Valley (Sacramento and surrounding counties), CA; Oregon; Silicon Valley, CA; Tacoma/Pierce County, WA; and Waccamaw Region, SC. ALF National exists to support these chapters with shared resources, programming and curriculum; and to connect over 5,000 ALF Senior Fellows nationwide who bring a new sense of commitment, understanding, and interconnectedness to their disparate communities.




2025 ALF National Board Retreat Lee Institute, Charlotte, NC

Carol Ornelas, Class IV, is the CEO of Visionary Home Builders of California (VHB)—a pioneering nonprofit affordable housing developer. Under her leadership, VHB has built thousands of apartments enriched with wraparound services designed to support farmworkers and low-income families. By providing stable housing, VHB empowers families and their children to thrive, build brighter futures, and break the cycle of poverty.

Although VHB had not yet established a presence in Modesto, California, Charlie Nguyen, Class X, saw an opportunity to change that. He brought together Carol, the Mayor of Modesto, and the City's Affordable Housing Director to explore the possibility of bringing VHB's transformative work to the community. Impressed by Carol's vision and track record, city leaders embraced the idea.

Just one year later, a 79-unit, six-story affordable housing development is fully funded and set to break ground in downtown Modesto in October 2025—a powerful testament to collaboration, leadership, and vision in action. Today, Charlie Nguyen continues to advance this mission as Vice Chair of VHB's Board of Directors, helping expand access to affordable housing and opportunity for all.



WALF has catalyzed unprecedented collaboration between three major regional organizations, directly addressing poverty in the tri-county area. Based on relationships built through WALF, Horry County United Way and Friendship Place have partnered with SC Thrive to create a comprehensive support ecosystem for low-to-moderate income families.

- Horry County United Way expanded rural outreach capacity and established a re-entry program
- Created signature "Thrive" program with Benefits Navigators providing direct financial coaching
- Friendship Place enhanced their Georgetown Lives program, moving from referral-only to direct client assistance

All three organizations (led by WALF Senior Fellows) now operate as an integrated support network.



ALF CONNECT: A NATIONAL NETWORK IS BORN



In 2023, ALF Chapters in Silicon Valley and Houston lead the charge to create an online community for all 5,000 Senior Fellows in forty-four states to connect with each other, for the first time in ALF's history.

Senior Fellows formed over thirty affinity groups, joining and strengthening diverse leaders around sustainability, Muslim / Jewish relations, anti-racism efforts, and specific community change initiatives.

In 2025, ALF Senior Fellows are forming new cross sector networks via ALF Connect, sharing resources and best practices in order to change systems and have lasting impact in their communities.



ALFN PROGRAMMING: LEADING WITH DIALOGUE





ALF National led two inspiring virtual dialogue events, joining and strengthening leaders from eight ALF chapters. We the People: Finding Common Ground for the Common Good featured two keynotes by Senior Fellows, Former US Attorney General Albert Gonzalez and Workday CDO Carin Taylor. A cross political fishbowl conversation followed, modeling the ALF dialogue across difference practice. In person dialogues at each chapter site followed, allowing Senior Fellows to process and collaborative on a local response.

Author and Founding Chair of the Presencing Institute Otto Scharmer shared his latest thinking on barriers to systems change and our opportunity as Senior Fellows to reframe how we problem solve and step into action.
